House Matters

S o, after a full Year of through School activity, coupled with a huge learning curve of all things Housey in the Senior Section, we have moved someway to creating our own version of Hogwarts in Wakefield.



Boys have been proudly wearing their new House colours on their PE kits and captains, their ties and staff have been strongly biassed to anything sporting their own house colours. We've hosted over 100 separate competitions and events this year, some of which have allowed whole Foundation participation across both boys' and girls' schools. Prior to Xmas we had Staff challenges (Savile), Cross Country (Savile), Heads or Tails (Cave), Pub Quiz (Cave), Proud to BE (Cave), English Poetry (3 way tie - Cave, Freeston, Savile), Xmas Cards (Freeston), Global Entrepreneurship Week (Bentley), #onethingless (Bentley in Senior Section, Bentley in Junior section and Freeston in the Pre Prep Section), Senior Maths Challenge (Cave), Bowling (Savile), Masterchef (Freeston), Badminton (Savile), Geography (Bentley) and various guizzes at the end of term in addition to the Junior Section events that have always traditionally been held.







Then the momentum really began to build as the warmer weather started to appear and the bigger sporting activities that everyone was clamouring for began. Cross country (Cave), Hockey (Savile) and football filled the calendar for many weeks - with Bentley winning overall across the dozens of matches played taking individual titles in Y13 and 8, Savile taking Y7, 11 and 12, Cave Y10 and Freeston Y9 - so at least a little bit for everyone to cheer about there.

Mr Lewis and his team held a superb music competition that brought parents into the fray too and games lessons began to take the houses on board in their end of term programmes. The House guizzes have been a really good addition to School life and have been held across a range of subjects from MFL (Freeston), to Classical Civilisation (Cave), from Mathematics (Bentley) to general trivia (Cave) - plus the obligatory sport one (Savile - yet again proving that anything to do with sport is their thing!) The guizzes brought boys from the Junior section all the way up to Year 13 together in a way, alongside staff also that we haven't really seen before and for me, this has been the significant success of the Houses this year - the various Jubilee events and the recent sports day highlighted this really well and has been a fitting end to a lot of work by the House Leaders and House Captains as well as all staff and boys throughout.

So, to the eagerly awaited results and the points - it is worth mentioning that across the whole Boys' Section there have been over 100,000 House points and merits awarded this year and the overall winner was crowned by a difference of only 272 points - individual winners have been Freeston for the Junior Section, Bentley for the Senior Section and Savile for the specific events, including Sports Day - however, through consistency and a solid approach across the whole of School life - plus managing to hold off a late surge by Savile when the weather warmed up - Mr Affleck and his team are proudly awarded as the first through School winners and can proudly boast to be the first ever winners of the Calvert Cup. Congratulations and I await for next year's bigger and better Hogwarts!





Senior Section News

he English Department was delighted to welcome back Old Sav, Adam Cunis, on Friday: now an accomplished actor with the Globe Theatre in London, he spent the morning with a Year 12 Literature group, and the afternoon with Year 7, in both instances bringing his tremendous dramatic expertise (and experience) to illuminate challenging texts by Oscar Wilde and Shakespeare.





It was wonderful to see him (literally) 'walking through' Wilde's An Ideal Husband with Year 12: exploring it very much as an actor, and not as a critic or academic 'expert'. This made the text fresh and dynamic for the A-Level students; and I was very much struck by his refusal ever to 'speak down' to a pupil (or, for that matter, a teacher): his interest in others' viewpoints, difficulties and observations is always genuine, never feigned. He has that rare ability to give his total attention to whoever is speaking, which can be truly transformative.

This was also much in evidence with the Year 7 workshop, in which I saw a group of KS3 pupils delighting in the physical and verbal comedy of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream: Adam was able to draw out even the most reticent of pupils, fully involving them, helping them actually experience Shakespeare, rather than just 'study' him: he showed them a writer who might have something real to say to them in an ever-changing world of iPhones and proliferating social media.



For my part, I found it humbling to reflect that I had taught Adam Theatre Studies A-Level way back in 2006 - but here I was, learning so much in turn from him, and very much myself being taught. So - all in all - a fantastic day: thank you, Adam!

The first concept is Kaizen. This is a Japanese term that in its simplest form means "change for the better". Kaizen speaks to a deeper meaning which is a philosophy of continual

improvement in all aspects of a person or organisation's approach.

The idea is that implementing small changes and being vigilant about where to make improvements will lead to significant results.



The second concept is time travel. I really enjoy movies with a time travel or time loop structure with my favourites when growing up being Back to the Future and Groundhog Day. In Back to the Future, Marty McFly travels back to 1955 and can influence events in his parent's past to change his future for the better. In Groundhog Day, Bill Murray's Phil relives the same day again and again until he achieves complete understanding of the people and events in the small town of Punxsutawney. Harlow Carr Photography Visit

On 28th June our next cohort of GCSE Photography students visited the magnificent RHS Harlow Carr Gardens, Harrogate, as a means of getting to know the DSLR cameras that we use for the course.

The gardens are spectacular at any time of the year, but are particularly beautiful in the summer. Students were tasked with applying compositional techniques to their photography, in order to create balanced and aesthetic photographs that challenged normal perspectives of the natural world.

In the second half of the day, students used black and white film cameras to collect images of the landscape that would emphasise contrast and texture. We are looking forward to developing these photographs in September, using traditional darkroom photography techniques. A number of our students have relatives or family friends who used to develop their own photographs at home, in DIY darkrooms. The students are fascinated at the prospect of trying this out for themselves. Do watch this space - we will share the results!

B ouldering Club meets every Thursday after school and makes use of the brilliant facilities at City Bloc, an indoor bouldering centre in Leeds. Boys attending through the academic year have made excellent progress under the watchful eye of the instructors at City Bloc, and from watching the climbing skills of the attending teachers!

Bouldering involves climbing up an artificial wall to a height of approximately 4 metres above crash mats (there are no ropes). Routes are set at different grades using colour coded hand and foot holds. These routes are reset regularly to provide fresh mental and physical challenges.

Boys work towards completing all routes at a particular grade level, with the intention of climbing higher grades in time. This means lots of work on "blues, greys and oranges" with the occasional "yellow" for the stronger climbers. The environment is very supportive and the focus is more about challenging yourself and getting "Bloc Strong" than being better than someone else.

There is also a competitive element to bouldering and to this end City Bloc hosts a Summer League in their dedicated competition room. Points are scored for finishing a route on the 1st, 2nd or 3rd attempt, with a successful first attempt being known as a "flash". It has been great to see some of our lads (Charlie Fisher and Ciaran McWilliam) getting their names onto the top 10 Junior Male Leaderboard.





Jon is a Patent Attorney and he tells us all about his journey on this unique and intriguing career pathway, from studying Physics to qualifying in the legal profession.



Spotlight On: Old Savilians

Since leaving QEGS life has taken quite a few transitions. I qualified in Dentistry at Newcastle University in 2011, following which I undertook further training and qualification working in Oral Surgery, Restorative Dentistry, Sedation, Oral Medicine, Community Dentistry, private and NHS practice. I gained a diploma in



conscious sedation in dentistry and worked my up to be a clinical trainer for Newcastle upon Tyne NHS trust. This job involved training dental students and postgraduates in oral surgery and sedation. I'd managed to rapidly accelerate into such a position that usually takes many years to get to.

This was achieved by having a real passion for the work, taking the right jobs that interested me the most and making friends in the right places. Ensuring you get a very long string of letters after the name always helps too in this area, but does come at a cost with lots of studying and exams.

Life had other ideas for me though and took an unexpected twist with a diagnosis of bilateral carpal tunnel syndrome in 2017.

This basically means getting numbness and loss of grip in both hands, not ideal for the field of surgery where you need both good feeling and grip.

Moving to the present day, 2 surgeries to the right hand later, and still awaiting a fix for the left, I have been unable to work in dentistry since 2017. But fortunately, a passion for beekeeping and my wife Suzie have been a bit of saviour in the last couple of years keeping the home fires burning when an income protection insurance company let us down.



Looking forward I hope to be able to utilise my skills in dentistry again if the next surgery is successful. I had never appreciated just how long something like carpal tunnel could take to be fixed. The important message here I think is to not be too reliant on one thing, one company or one idea ever. Spread your net widely, enjoy what you do, appreciate there is always another way forward, and if anyone is looking for a very different career, Northumberland Honey Company is part of the Bee Farmers Association apprenticeship scheme and is always on the look out for the next apprentice!

My wife Suzie finished a PhD in molecular nutrition and started working in a business we set up Northumberland Honey Company, producing honey and a 'champagne method' sparkling mead. Back when this business started with only 20 colonies of bees there was no idea where it would lead to or what it could mean to us now. With some misfortune and some occasional good luck along the way, the company is now supporting us both and 2 bee farming apprentices.

We now keep 200 colonies of bees, produce thousands of queen bees a year to sell to other beekeepers and produce around 6-8 tonnes of honey a year, not to mention the sparkling mead.
